



Message from the Director



I asked one of the bank officers who was born and brought up in Chamrusai in Midnapore District, what his opinion was about Catholic Relief Services (CRS) food. He told me "ami bulgar keyeyi manush hohechi" ("What I am today is because of Bulgar"). This could be said by many of our people who were brought up in our tribal hostels. Now that this programme is closed down, Seva Kendra Calcutta has to search for new identity. In this process we are looking for new avenues, new roles and new ways by which Seva Kendra Calcutta still can have impact on the lives of people

Community College is a new way of making the youth "fit for job and fit for life". Youth who come out of our modern day formal educational institutions have very little chance to go for professional training. The Central Government of India has many professional training programmes for the youth. Seva Kendra Calcutta has been able to get the recognition for Modular Employable Scheme (MES). Through MES we have been able to make our Community College studies affordable for even the poor youth and where we can give certificate from the Central Government. Our new center at Serampur in Hooghly District would be the second center for the activities of Seva Kendra Community College.

Community Care Centers for HIV/AIDS is another new venture of Seva Kendra Calcutta. We have one center at Dum Dum and another at Midnapore. Both these centers have accommodation for 10 patients each and have been rendering service last one year. At Midnapore we are also developing a hospital for TB and Leprosy patients with the support of Likvidace Lepry of Czech Republic. Outdoor patients are treated at present and in future the hospital would have facility for 40 indoor patients.

"Save the Mother Earth", is the cry of the time. Seva Kendra Calcutta, in its little way has been able support the work for Renewable Energy. We have a workshop to produce Solar Lamps, Solar Home Lighting Systems, Solar Street Lights and Solar Hot Water arrangements. We train people on roof water harvesting system, production of solar lights and developing of solar hot water systems. Lutheran World Services and Development Research Communication Services Center have requested us to train their personnel in

After they return in the evening, they drink and quarrel unaware that Laxmi is frightened of this daily affair. At the STAG centre Laxmi always remains happy as she loves to study. She hopes to be a good woman in the future. Her teachers describe her as a child who "always remains happy with a special smile on her face and loves to make others happy too."


Batch 2009-2010 **Present status**



- Seven children have shown remendous improvement. They need to be mainstreamed.
- Nineteen children are being prepared for mainstreaming six months from now.
- One child has been mainstreamed into Class IV
- Three children left the centre on medical grounds.
- Three more left as child and parents were not motivated enough.

- Created homely atmosphere/environment for children especially from tribal areas of coming

- Local contribution collected 80.67% (Rs. 9,600.00 out of Rs. 11,900.00)

The "Rag pickers development program" was initiated in November 2008 in four clusters under jurisdiction 57 & 58 ward of Kolkata metropolitan city namely Kilkhana, Lanedhar, Kuliatangra and Muslim camp. The habitats of these places are mostly vulnerable and neglected population of Urban Kolkata. The purpose of launching this programme is to empower these people who are unaware of the detrimental situation in which they are living.

IDP (Integrated Development Project)

The IDP which is at force in 55 tribal villages, including 5 blocks and touching the lives of 5,500 people benefiting directly or indirectly , in the district of West Midnapur. Women are not left behind in this revolution but they have become a very integral part of this new era, through involvement in 311 SHGs (Self Help Groups). It is successful in putting an end to the huge masses migrating to cities in search of better jobs through its number of self employment schemes and IGA (Income Generation Activities). Youth power has also been given a good recognition and streaming them to various leadership and capacity building programs, voluntary actions, Awareness programs etc. Today IDP claims to secure 100% enrolment in



schools, 80% awareness and practice on hygienic and healthy living. It has also included the need to change detrimental government policies, use grassroots experiences and innovations as the basis for improved policies, and strengthen local capacities. It has also enabled this "low income population" to participate in the governmental process, which acts as a crucial vehicle for exercising their rights and holding government accountable. As such, they play a vital role in strengthening democracy and the skills of citizenship essential to healthy society.


DOTs (Direct Observed Therapy Short course)

DOTs was initiated by SKK, in the year 2009, keeping in mind, to cure and aware, the victims suffering from this fatal disease, Tuberculosis, in Kharagpur town. It is the first impact project from CBCI under the RNTCP scheme. We have a tie up with the WB State Health Department (State General Hospital, Kharagpur and Hijli Rural Hospital), from where we get patients, who are defaulting. Altogether we have covered 13 wards, where we have DOTs providers, who carry on the task as directed by the DOTs supervisor from SKK. Presently we have 6 patients (2 have already completed the course and are referred for the sputum test), who are getting treatment under this DOTs supervision. Besides this SKK conducts trainings for the DOT providers, Sensitization and Awareness programs, regular home visit etc.

because it carries on its dreams, as most of the trainings are conducted here. It not only provides food and stay but also offers a perfect combination of mental relief and relaxation, to its participants. The well furnished training centre of SKK has 24 rooms and 1 dormitory, which can accommodate up to 60 people. There are three conference halls (small, medium and large) and can accommodate 30 500 people at a time. The training halls are equipped with laptops, LCDs, OHP, TVs, VCD and quality sound system. With time, it has developed a far reaching effect, which is not only limited to the local participants but also attracting participants from outside. Across the years Seva Kendra Kharagpur, has built a reputation of service and trust worthiness and is now considered, a boon in disguise for the entire district.

In many hostels there are specifically selected children which do not represent the children of the local communities. This should be improved.

On the other hand it is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness. Every educated child is a seed which will grow to bear fruit for the prosperity of future generations.

Seeing all these finally the dealer requested the group not to go to the higher level and agreed to keep the MRO shop open twice a day for five days in a week. Background

The need for giving emphasis on the Skill Development, especially for the less educated, poor and out of school youth has been highlighted in various forums. The skill level and educational attainment of the workforce determines the productivity, income levels as well as the adaptability of the working class in changing environment. A large percentage of people in India are living below poverty line. One of the important causes is a lower percentage of skilled persons in the workforce.



The skill development at present is taking place mostly in the formal way i.e. persons acquire skill at the work-place when they help their parents, relatives and employers etc. Such persons do not have a formal certificate and thus earn lower wages and

are exploited by employers. They have come through informal system due to socio-economic circumstances of the family and the compulsions of earning livelihood rather than attending a formal course. While their productivity is low, their contribution to the nation GDP cannot be ignored. To address this issue, the Govt. of India have introduced a system of certification which not only recognizes their skills but also provides education and training in a mode that suits their economic compulsions, it will not only benefit the workforce to earn a decent living but also contribute to the nation economy by better productivity of this workforce.

Another related problem to be tackled is a large number of students drop out (About 60% of the school students drop out at different stages before reaching Class X).

The Concept of MES

- * Identification of 'minimum skills set' which is sufficient to get an employment in the labour
- * It allows skills up gradation, multi skilling, multi entry and exit, vertical mobility and L i f e l o n g learning opportunities in a flexible
- * It also allows recognition of prior learning (certification of skills

- acquired informal) Effectively.
- The modules in a sector when grouped together could lead to a qualification equivalent to National Trade Certificate or higher.
- MES would benefit different target groups like:
- Workers seeking certification of their skills acquired informally
- -Workers seeking skill up
- Early school drop-outs and unemployed
- Previously child labour and their family


