



# Message from the Director



During the last two years, Seva Kendra Calcutta has been making efforts to approach the bigger donor agencies, government and corporate bodies for our various programmes. To do this we needed a structural change in our administrative committees, decision-making process and implementation of various initiatives, accounting systems and visibility of programmes. During this time, we have been also working to enhance our services so that we can become a real professional agency.

This approach demands of us to open to all the areas and all people in need. This may affect us as we would not be able to concentrate all our activities around our parishes and church institutions. This may also lead to a question as to what Seva Kendra Calcutta is doing for our people.

Our people are all those in need and suffering; not necessarily those who are involved in our parish or church activities. Our work goes beyond our little institutions to all those people who are in need.

If our helping hands do not extend beyond our church institutions it is no more charity. We need to go beyond our people to all people in need, in turn all the people should become our people and then only we can call Seva Kendra . Calcutta a truly "Charitable Institution". I am happy to inform that most of our projects are open to people without any distinction of caste, culture or creed. Last year one of our major works was "Aila rehabilitation" in Sandeshkhali block of North 24 Parganas district where not a single family was a Christian. We went to a place where other NGOs were not ready to go because it was one of the most interior and unapproachable places.

Caritas India, Catholic Relief Services and Concern Worldwide came forward generously to support this venture. Apart from these agencies some of our Catholic institutions like: Sisters of Charity (Convent Road), Providence School (FMM), Don Bosco (YCS), Cloistered Nuns (Carmel), Loreto College (Middleton Row), Loreto Convent (Entally) and St. Xavier's College supported this programme by way of finance, sending doctors and students as volunteers and also providing relief materials.

Khulna in Sandeshkhali one of the areas where we worked, is one of the villages selected for a bigger project from ECHO for rehabilitation. This most interior island has about four thousand families. Practically 80% of these families live in mud shelters. During the Aila cyclone they lost their dwellings. It was a great joy for us to work in this village with the support given by quite a number of our institutions. The village committee is active in helping us to assess, plan and prepare our programmes.

·Twenty-five children enrolled at present- fourteen boys and eleven girls

Activities/Achievements

Twenty-six children mainstreamed into formal schools-nine boys and seventeen girls

Biswanath Mahili is an intelligent child. He used to study in Class III. There are ten members in his family. But there are only two earning members in the family. As their "A promising future" occupation is cultivation, the financial status of the family is low. Many nights Biswanath has to go to

sleep only having one meal during the day. Thus though Biswanath is intelligent and his family is interested in his education, the family's financial state could not support his studies. So he had to drop out of his school.

Biswanath's parents came with much hope to one of Seva Kendra Calcutta's camps in Dantan Block. These camps are organized every year with the goal to screen dropout children for the mainstreaming centre at Palbari, Midnapore. At the interview, Biswanath proved his brilliance and answered every question that came his way. He was immediately enrolled into the mainstreaming centre.

At the centre, Biswanath has proved his caliber. He is at the top of all achievers at the centre!

- ICDP meetings organized with parents every month to give a feedback for child's progress and help develop a healthy childguardian rapport for all-round development of their ward
- Organized visits to schools in Dhahara, North Amdria, Bonguara, Madurui and Nilpura to seek evaluation from Head Masters and teachers about the newly mainstreamed children
- STAG methodology & Joyful learning methods employed to allow dropout children to cultivate interest for study
- Exposure visits conducted to zoo and parks to enable children to widen their knowledge through observing and also relaxation from daily routine
- Helped children to open up and realize their full potentials through co-curricular activities like songs, dance, recitation and just meeting visitors
- Received positive feedback from guardians and party workers in the locality regarding methods employed to educate the dropouts and also the general health set-up of the centre

## Serampore, Hooghly

(We express our gratitude to Indienhilfe e.V. Germany, for supporting this project)

#### **Present Status**

- Twenty children have enrolled in total
- Two have been mainstreamed- Dasarat Roy into Class I and Rubina Khatun into Class VII
- One child left the centre on medical grounds and then migrated from the previous address
- Fifteen boys and two girls between the age group of 8-14 years, are receiving training under the STAG methodology
- Atghora Jasaikathi Gram Panchayat & Tepul Mirza Gram Panchayat in District North 24 Parganas are targetted areas to combat child labour

"I need to study to make it big in life"

Bapon Munda

Ten year old Bapon Munda is a tribal child from Rudrapur village GP of Atghora Jasaikathi in North 24 Parganas. Both his parents work in a saw mill where he too spent almost a year without going to school. He helped his parents by working in the saw mill to earn a little extra money.



The parents had no time or interest for

Bapon's education. Bapon too did not show any interest in going to a regular school. He shared that he had no strong friend circle as he was one of the few tribals at school. He also did not get mid-day meals at his

previous school. His weakness in Mathematics was another important reason for his to drop out of school.

Now once he enrolled in the Mainstreaming centre at Serampore, Bapon has realized that education is a must to make it big in life. The centre has encouraged him to overcome his weak points especially in Mathematics and Bengali. He has shown his brighter side which is very promising. Bapon can, not only read Bengali fluently, but can also work with the four Mathematical calculations easily! Bapon's friend circle prove that he can make friends confidently too. We can say that we find him a promising individual at the centre.



## Development Program for Rag Pickers in Kolkata Slums

A call to come together .....



The "Development Program for Rag Pickers Muslim camp was suffering last few years. (DPRP)" was initiated in November 2008. Under jurisdiction 57 & 58 ward of city of Kolkata Kilkhana, Lanedhar, Kuliatangra and Muslim camp in four clusters, we began the work. This area is the home as well as the work place of the most vulnerable and neglected people; such as rag pickers and rag segregationists. They recycle the city garbage, so they could be called "the beautifiers of the metropolitan city", but usually

their role is unrecognized in the waste management system of the city.

As they are migrants and often seen as temporary residents of the city, can explain why few governments have designed policies to improve their situations. Most of them do not have identity cards or birth certificates and therefore do not have access

to basic government facilities. This programme facilitates the process of empowering these people who are careless of the detrimental situation in which they are living and unaware of their rights.

#### *Impact Vs Activity*

Owning Public resources - With the growing health awareness the people of this area started using the Public health services.

Now this center has become alive. Twenty-three school going children received have a peaceful death' educational grants from 'West Bengal Minorities Development & Finance Corporation' through schools by motivating them to apply for the grant.

→ Out of the shell - the youth and Task Forces were mobilized and capacitated by trainings and formed four groups in the four clusters. They organize, competitive programs for the rag picking community for all age groups, to generate awareness and cohesiveness in them. These acts were a push for the rag picking people to 'come out from their shell' so that they can

claim their due rights.

Working together as change agents – people in groups and as individuals are organizing community meetings, participating in Para level meeting, Stake holder meeting and mobilizing the target people

to attend these programs. The ceaseless efforts of the animators Task Force, Youth and CP members, could make this possible. Trainings in various subjects like Participatory Learning and Action, Leadership, Communication, HIV, Tuberculosis, DOTs,

minimum safety measures while waste collection, importance of vaccination, Climatic changes etc were organized by them.

■ Greater work forces to deal with – Like minded NGOs came together and shared their objectives, activities and process/methodology so that they have networking among themselves, better understanding about each other's work and work together.

the Gram Panchayats of Chandipur, Ramchandrapur, Nayabastila, Sayestanagar I & II and Bajitpur.

#### Activities and Impact of our Intervention....

- ▶ 50 Community Vigilance Committees (CVC) are formed.
- ▶ 50 Adolescent Girls Group (AGG) are formed who are responsible in their villages.
- Linkage and Networking with Government line Dept., Clubs, Panchayat members etc.
- Display of IEC Materials (Posters, leaflets, banners etc...)
- Film shows on related issues like trafficking, child labour, early marriage and school dropout were shown to the villagers to bring awareness.

Sheila (name changed) was a small town girl. She was offered a job as a maid in another city. Sheila readily accepted the offer. Instead of providing a job the man took her to a brothel and sold her in Mumbai, where she was forced into

One day she managed to escape but she was stopped by the Case study guards. They forced her to spend the night with them. She was threatened by the head of the brothel and she was forced to have sex with 25 customers a day. Whenever she refused, she was violently beaten with iron pipe in front of other workers. She lived with crippling fear. A social worker, taking the help of the Mumbai police, rescued some girls from the brothel. Sheila was one of them. Now Sheila is placed in a care home, where she is given life skill programme to face the challenges of new life and look toward a future with full of hope.

- 30 youth groups are formed, one each in a village.
- People have realized the importance of registering their names in the Migration Register at the GP office while going
- Participatory Learning & Action (PLA) was conducted in each village.





## A ray of hope in Mumtaz's life

Location: North Kazipara; Barasat I Block; North 24 Parganas District, West Bengal



Majority of the inhabitants of this area belong to the Muslim community. Their main source of livelihood is cottage industries like stitching and hand embroideries. Mumtaz Begum , aged 46 ears from Kazipara North, Ward No. 11 has come to this place with her husband Mir Kasem in 1990. After one year her husband ran away with other woman left her alone since then Mumtaz has to earn er livelihood single handedly.

the engages herself as a domestic maid in homes of nearby town. It was not easy for her with many challenges, she faced. Inspired by fellow neighbors she joined "Bakul" Self Help Group in February 2008. During the group meetings the animator of Seva Kendra Calcutta, provided the members with information on the importance of linkages and the facilities offered from bank. Inspired by this

guidance from SKC, the SHG decided to open an account in the bank. Mumtaz Begum first availed a loan of Rs. 1600/- in September 2008 from the group to start business on buying & selling of saris to nearby locality. It was a great help. Through this business, Mumtaz Begum was able to earn meager Rs150/- per month.

After six months, the animator of Seva Kendra Calcutta met the bank manager and applied for a group loan, then in March 2009 Mumtaz Begum got loan from Bank Rs. 25,000/- and started the business with big seed capital. Her present earnings almost come to Rs. 3000/- per month and have a capital of Rs. 75,000/-.

Mumtaz's loan is still being refunded now. She has become the inspiration to other group members.

#### Action Research Project on

#### "Renewable Energy for Public Health and Environmental Awareness"




As a learning organization SKC has initiated this action research based on the interventions and experiences in the village Kalidaherpota, booth no 93/63 of Bitharihakimpur Panchayat of Swarupnagar block of North 24 Parganas district, West Bengal, India.

The people in Kalidaherpota have no electricity. They depend on their small kerosene lamps for the lighting of their homes. These lamps are often kept inside the closed doors, thus exposing the users to a polluted ambience within home. Children often have vision

problem owing to poor light and they find it hard to devote much time to their study. After

the sunset, due to pitch darkness prevailing in the area and due to absence of electrical street lights, within the village social interaction too is restricted. The fuel they buy to light the house is kerosene which rationed (200 ml/person/week), which is expensive, even more when it is bought in the open market, (Rs 12/lit in the ration shop is Rs 40-50 in the open market).

Therefore, the research team thought of promoting renewable energy technology such as solar lamp and smokeless chulla, which is eco-friendly, easily made available economically viable and ensures healthy environment. This action research will





#### Research problem

Kerosene is very expensive for domestic use and it is affecting the education,

economic, social and public health status of the family. Human exposure to emission of carbon dioxide and other

gases causes health hazards like pulmonary, visionary and skin diseases.



- ☐ Education: Will children do better in studies by using solar lantern?
- Economic: Will the family have any economic benefit adopting solar lantern for domestic lighting?
- **Social:** Whether family and community get more time to have social gathering

#### **Assumptions**

- 1. Light has great role to play in the life of people on all levels: Health, Educational, Social, Cultural and other aspects of life.
- 2. Introducing Solar Energy especially light will provide overall well-being of people. It does not just light their evenings, but bring change in their life as a whole.
- 3. A healthy self-reflected change would make people more self-reliant and

## increase their self-respect promoting a marked growth in education, economic, social and public health.

#### Research Approach

This action research attempts to qualitative and quantitative tools of data collections to be used at Kalidaherpota village, booth no 93/63 of Bitharihakimpur Panchayat of Swarupnagar block of North 24 Parganas district.

#### **Stakeholders**

The primary stakeholders identified as who are direct participants and secondary stakeholders are representatives from institutions and administration. Village Energy Committee will disseminate the knowledge to the community as given to them through several awareness programs and input sessions.

CMDRR is the new nomenclature for CBDP (Community Based Disaster Preparedness). The stress in this project is reducing risks during disasters. CBDP programme was organized in Swarupnagar block and it was a great success. Now we have moved into another block near the Bangladesh border. It is one of the most neglected areas and affected by the floods every year. This selection was done after we had a discussion with the Block Development Officer and Block Disaster Management Officer. Seventy two most vulnerable sansads were selected by Panchayati Raj Institutions (PRI) for this work. Most of the work, organization and planning were done by the local people. The local people take the responsibility to contact the authorities and involve them in the disaster risk reduction programme. In this programme they are able to use NREGA (National



Rural Employees Guarantee Act) and IAY (Indira Abash Yojana) schemes. The most beautiful thing which happens in this programme is that people become alive and take responsibility for their safety. People themselves manage and do the work which is immediately needed. The staff and the animators just facilitate this people's movement in each village. We give below a table explaining the main activities of the programme and also the experience of Mr. Sanat Gaine, Pradhan of Miloni G.P.

Getting closer to CMDRR: Mr. Sanat Gaine, is an active Panchayet member and also the Pradhan of Miloni G.P. under the jurisdiction of Badhuria block. He is serving his

second term as an elected member. He is involved in many social and cultural activities. According to him "now my eyes are opened and I have got a new dimension to work with the people. It was 2010 May, Seva Kendra Calcutta one of the NGOs approached us to work for the people of Miloni Panchayet. We received them half heartedly. We never showed any interest in the

initial stage. But they did not leave us. Gradually all of us in our booth got involved with the people without knowing. We started liking their way of capacitating people. I was surprised to notice, the way people and especially women helped us in planning development activities was very surprising. We noticed the planning of other GS also very

> realistic and specific. People mentioned their specific roles and plans. We found people lack health and hygiene permanently in all the booths. Seeing their interest and willingness, they also stretched out their hands and implemented low cost sanitary scheme through Task force members in each booth. We are happy and confident to continue much more PRI activities through Task force members. Truly saying, CMDRR

helped me to know the situation of our area and people, which is a great help for our GP to implement PRI schemes as per the need of our area."



## SAC (Stichting Actie Calcutta, the Netherlands)

A foundation supporting disadvantaged children in India (We express our gratitude to SAC for supporting this project)



In the year under review there were no changes in the constitution of the board of SAC. Practically all the members of the board and other volunteers are pensioned and spend part of their free time for

the promotion of good education for the poorest children in particular parts of India with much enthusiasm.

In the past year much importance was given to a renewal of SAC's policy.

Discussions were held regarding "marketing and communication" because of a continuous decline of the number of sponsors due to deaths of old faithful sponsors and financial problems and disinterest of others. This results in a reduction of sponsorships for various centres. SAC therefore tries to improve its image in order to attract sponsors in the age group thirties to sixties, especially families with adolescent children.

Also the types of sponsorships were considered, specifically the so-called name sponsored children. The administration of these sponsorships is very time-consuming in the centres in India as well in the office of SAC.

Furthermore the need of hostels is at stake. Stress will be laid more on balwadis, teaching/coaching centres, CBO (Community Based Organisation), vocational training etc. SAC will gradually withdraw its support to centres which have been aided for more than 15 years. Too many years can lead to undesired dependency and lack of initiatives for self support.

SAC enjoyed several visitors from India, amongst others Bishop Julius Marandi of Dumka Diocese and Bishop Sarat Chandra Nayak of Berhampur Diocese. It was very pleasant to have all of them as guests and to discuss various items of interest such as sponsorships, projects and perspectives.

On the other hand SAC people visited various centres aided by SAC in India.

Mieke Hillenaar (sponsorships and first time in India) and Mr. Jan and Mrs. Henny Boekema went



specifically to Asansol diocese. They were introduced to the "Community Oriented Education Programme" and subsequently saw various teaching centres in function. They were very much impressed by the set-up of the programme under the leadership of Fr. Wilson Fernandes. Mr. Gerard Vijverberg (project committee) spent a hectic time at the bishop's house in Balasore meeting many fathers and sisters who were involved with projects. He also went to Berhampur diocese and did the same over there besides a tiresome trip to various centres with sponsorships and projects.

For Mr. Wim de Jongh (treasurer) and his wife Marianne it was their first visit to various centres in Dumka diocese. They were introduced by Mr. Leendert Hoogendam (office

manager). For Mr. Wim these visits were of great importance because of the financial reports of the expenditures of SAC money.



## Sindhu Tara Training Centre-Digha

Local resource mobilization is one of the important factors in the social development sector. Four years ago we had decided that 50% of the money which we mobilize for social work should be from local resources. In view of this we built a training centre at a sea resort at Digha called Sindhu Tara which started to function in 2010. This centre will cater for all those who would like to have trainings, seminars, workshop and meetings in a centre which attracts thousands of tourists.

Sindhu Tara also gives an opportunity for the families of those who are involved with Seva Kendra Calcutta to go and spend

Sindhu Tara also gives an opportunity for the families of those who are involved with Seva Kendra Calcutta to go and spend some time at a resort and come back refreshed. We would be organizing programmes at the centre which would enhance the interreligious, developmental and educational aspects of social sector. At present we have two conference rooms with dining, kitchen and accommodation for fifty-two people. Already some groups have conducted programmes at the centre.

## Aila" affected Ghotihara village

(We express our gratitude to Caritas for supporting this project) Ghotihara village is one of the most interior villages in Kalinagar panchayat in Sandeshkhali Block of 24 Parganas (N) District. There is neither electricity connection in the village nor possibility of it in the near future. This interior village has about eight hundred and fifty families. When we asked them whether they would like to have solar lanterns, they were very happy. They found it, very difficult to pay Rs. 1,350/- at a time. At this juncture Caritas India came to help us with funds for "Aila" affected region. So we were able to give them the solar lanterns for Rs. 700/-. After we made an agreement with the people of the area, we started the process. We selected twenty youth from the area and in two batches; we trained them to produce solar lanterns at Seva Kendra Calcutta. They produced five lanterns with the help of our technicians as part of their training and the sixth one they produced by themselves. This was a seven day training programme.

We hired a small room in Kalinagar. The twenty trained are able to repair the lanterns in the village itself. youth produced eight hundred and fifty lanterns and sold

them in Ghotihara village within a time period of three months. These youth themselves earned Rs. 12,000/- to Rs. 15,000/- each for producing and selling the lanterns. Now every family in Ghotihara village is a proud owner of a solar lantern. Children of these families now, find their

the solar lantern gives them light.

Sandeshkhali I & II and Hingalganj blocks there are several villages without electricity and people are using kerosene



lamps. Many have expressed their willingness to buy the solar lanterns for Rs. 1,350/-. The twenty trained youth are able to produce the solar lanterns further, sell them in the area, and earn their livelihood. They also give a guarantee for these solar lanterns for one year. If needed these youth are able to repair the lanterns in the village itself.

#### Solar lantern

Among the solar initiatives of Seva Kendra Calcutta, I feel the solar lantern is the most creative and socially meaningful venture. We have been producing solar lanterns during the last four to five years. We started with distributing solar lanterns at a low subsidized rate and later we assembled our own solar lanterns. At the third stage, we trained people to assemble solar lanterns. /and now in the villages where there is no electricity people are able to assemble and sell the solar lanterns.



We are very happy to say that we are neither receiving any subsidy from the Govt. nor getting any foreign funds to develop these aspects.



We had trained people from different organizations coming from Gujarat, Bihar and Tamil Nadu. I am sure gradually this will grow into a movement.

Apart from this we are also helping institutions and individuals to use solar street lights, solar home lights, solar hot water systems and so on.



## Seva Kendra Community Care Centre, Dum Dum

Seva Kendra Community Care Centre was established in September 2008 to provide Care, Support and treatment to people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA) with the support from Catholic Bishops Conference of India-Health Commission.

**Goal of the project:** To reduce HIV (Human immunodeficiency virus) related morbidity and mortality in adults and children, and mitigate the impact of HIV on children and women headed households.

#### **Objectives of Community Care Centre:**

- \* To provide care to PLHA on adherence to ART (Antiretroviral therapy), OI (Opportunistic infection) treatment, nutrition, and psycho-social support through in-patient and out-patient services.
- \* To provide care to PLHA on nutritional education, prevention education, home based care and psycho-social support through one-to-one or telephone counseling or outreach service.

- \* To strengthen referral systems for early detection of HIV, access to HIV services and Community support.

There are altogether 960 New Clients registered at our CCC from the initiation till 31<sup>st</sup> March 2011. Out of these 843 are ON ART (ART initiated) & 117 are Not ON ART (ART not yet initiated).

#### **Women Frontiers of Development**

Women's Empowerment is a process in which women gain greater share of control over all resources: Intellectually knowledge and information, financially access to money and socially control over decision-making in the home, community and society. Seva Kendra Calcutta started forming SHG's for women in 24 Paraganas (N), Howrah and Midnapore area in June 2003. Slowly the groups formed and register CBO (Community Base Organization) in June 2009. It has helped women to be self-reliant.

The group members meet regularly for the SHGs to discuss and plan. The initial aim of the groups was to organize people into groups provide income generation opportunities to women, provide lower interest rates for procuring loans so that women have the right to make decision in social life. Seva Kendra Calcutta has played a pivotal role in linking these groups with banks and Panchayat.
